A GROUNDBREAKING NEW BIOGRAPHY ...

ZORA MEALE HURSTON

American Experience is premiering a new biography featuring the life of Zora Neale Hurston. A trailblazing author and key figure in the Harlem Renaissance of the 1920s, she also pursued anthropological studies. Her groundbreaking work challenged the assumptions about race, gender, and philosophies that had defined the field in the 19th century. Throughout her life she strived to gain recognition in two worlds literary and scientific.

Hurston was born in Notasulga, Alabama, in 1891 and as a young child moved with her family to Eatonville, Florida, which became the setting for many of her stories.


While she was a student at Barnard College and Columbia University, Hurston conducted ethnographic research and had an interest in African American and Caribbean folklore. One of her friends described her as having a fiery intellect and an infectious sense of humor.


She wrote four novels and more than 50 short stories, plays, and essays. The most popular of her novels is Their Eyes Were Watching God. The story revolves around Janie Crawford and her coming of age as she changes from a quiet teenage girl to a mature woman in control of her own destiny. The book is regarded as influential to both African American and women's literature.

For more than a decade, Hurston conducted fieldwork in the American South and Caribbean islands, immersing herself in the cultures she studied and documenting stories, songs, and religious rituals. She explored the back roads of Florida and New Orleans to study hoodoo, or conjure religion, and in the 1930s traveled to Haiti on a fellowship to investigate West Indies ethnology.

During her career, she documented both the African American experience and her struggles as an African American woman. Hurston's writings and research reclaimed, honored, and celebrated Black life on its own terms — an idea that remains innovational today.

THE MAGIC OF SPIRITUALS

Great Performances celebrates its 50th anniversary with an exciting slate of programming that spans diverse performing arts genres.

The Magic of Spirituals reveals the behind-the-scenes story of Kathleen Battle and Jessye Norman's concert of spirituals at Carnegie Hall on March 18, 1990. The performances of both opera greats were extraordinary, bringing to light Battle and Norman as two of the finest sopranos in the world.

The concert featured many traditional spirituals including "In That Great Gettin' Up Morning," "Oh, What a Beautiful City," "Swing Low Sweet Chariot/Ride Up in the Chariot," and "Oh, Glory"— several as duets and others accompanied by a full gospel choir. In addition to extensive performance clips, the program features new interviews with

opera star Angel Blue, Met Opera General Manager Peter Gelb, and others.

Kathleen Battle was born in 1948 and is known for her distinctive vocal range and tone. She made her opera debut in 1975. She expanded her repertoire into lyric soprano and coloratura soprano roles during the 1980s and early 1990s. Jessye Norman, born in 1945, was an opera singer and recitalist. A commanding presence on the stage, she performed in a wide variety of leading vocalist roles with the Metropolitan Opera, the Paris Opera, and the Royal Opera, London.

A brilliant artist who transformed popular culture... ROBERTA FLACK

From "The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face" to "Killing Me Softly with His Song," Roberta Flack's songs have given voice to love, pain, hope, struggles, and more.

American Masters: Roberta Flack illuminates her artistry, career, and lifelong commitment to civil rights. Her stories are told through her personal interviews, archives of performances, home movies, and film documents. Other aspects of her life are revealed through interviews with Reverend Jesse Jackson, Clint Eastwood, Angela Davis, Yoko Ono, Valerie Simpson and others.

Flack began studying classical piano at age 9 and was awarded a full musical scholarship to Howard University at age 15. Her talent was recognized by jazz great Les McCann, who arranged an audition for Flack with Atlantic Records. They produced her debut album First Take in 1969.

She won several Grammy Awards and became the first artist to win the Grammy for Record of the Year in two consecutive years. She was also awarded a Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award. With a career spanning five decades, she is one of the most acclaimed, successful artists in pop and R&B music.

A new PBS KIDS series...



PBS KIDS has announced a new animated series for children 3 – 6 years old entitled Work It Out Wombats!.

It stars a playful trio of marsupial siblings – Malik, Zadie and Zeke — who live with their grandmother named Super. Their home is a massive treehouse apartment complex called Treeborhood, with secret passageways, gondolas, and rope swings.

The residents of Treeborhood are wombats, snakes, moose, kangaroos, iguanas, fish, tarsiers, and eagles that bring a variety of skills, traditions, and family structures to the vibrant community.

Malik, Zadie and Zeke have definite goals, but

how to effectively reach their objectives at first. In every story, they use computational thinking, a powerful tool that enables them to work together and achieve success.

Work It Out Wombats! strikes the ideal balance of telling stories that are educational as well as fun and engaging for children. Each episode includes two 11-minute stories, accompanied by a 90-second music video featuring the wombats demonstrating their computational thinking skills. If the problem is difficult, they join forces to figure out a workable solution. The program is structured to help children identify problems and learn how to solve them.





SEASON 3

The new season 3 of Miss Scarlet and The Duke presented by Masterpiece features six episodes that continue and expand upon the main storylines.

Kate Phillips reprises her lead role as Eliza Scarlet, who took over her father's detective business after he died unexpectedly. Although she knows the tricks of the trade, she still faces the challenge of getting society to take a female detective seriously. Stuart Martin continues in his role as Inspector William "The Duke" Wellington.

Episode 1, "The Vanishing" - A famous magician seemingly disappears into thin air and Eliza is hired to investigate, even though The Duke is already on the case.

Episode 2, "Arabella's" – Arabella Herbert, the girl who made life miserable for Eliza growing up, reappears as a kind, considerate adult. Even so, Eliza suspects that she may be a criminal.

Episode 3, "Hotel Saint Marc" - Eliza is on the trail of a notorious conman and tracks him to a hotel in France. She is convinced she has finally caught Scotland Yard's most wanted man.

Episode 4, "Bloodline" – Detective Fitzroy played by Evan McCabe sees one of his colleagues plant evidence on a suspect and hires Eliza to look into a case of police corruption.

Episode 5, "The Heir" – Eliza is on the verge of earning a considerable sum when she offers to help an heir to an unclaimed fortune. She needs the Duke's help, but what she has just learned makes working together impossible.

Episode 6, "The Jewel of the North" - The season comes to an explosive climax when Eliza receives a bomb in the mail and is determined to find out who is behind the deadly delivery. Quite a cliff-hanger to end the series!
